## HOW TO SCORE

Number the team as follows:

1. Pitcher	4. Second base	7. Left field
2. Catcher	5. Third base	8. Center field
3. First base	6. Short-stop	9. Right field

Commence score in left corner of square and advance the runner a corner for each base secured. Indicate as follows:

— Hit	Place in space left of circle
— Two-base hit	" " " below circle
— Three-base hit	" " " right of circle
— Home run	" " top of circle
X Run	" " circle

SH	Sacrifice	wp	Wild pitch
F	Fly out	o	Muffed fly ball
V	Passed grounder	W	Wild throw
A	Fumble	(	Muffed thrown ball
b	Base on balls	¶	Muffed foul fly
K	Strike out	K	Missed third strike
s	Stolen base	H	Hit by pitched ball
L	Foul fly-out	xx	Force out
B	Passed ball	x	Unsuccessful attempt

1-3-4-3 Caught and run out between bases. In this play credit first baseman with put-out and assist; pitcher and second baseman assisting.

Indicate bases as follows:

First, A. Second, B. Third, C. Home, H.

Number each out consecutively 1, 2, 3, placing same under the play thus:

6-3 1 > --- would mean, first man out; short-stop to first  
3-6 ---- Assist and out; first to short-stop.  
5-C---- Out unassisted; showing runner out by third  
                  baseman at third.  
F-9 3 > --- Would mean third man out on fly caught by right  
                  fielder.

K-2' -- Struck out; making two out

L-6 - Three out; foul fly caught by short-stop.

A base hit should be allowed when the ball is hit too hard to handle in time to catch the runner; or in case a ball is hit too slow that the fielder cannot reach it in time to make the play.

Give the runner the benefit of a doubt.

Charge a fielder with an error for each play that allows a runner to reach a base when up-to-date play could have prevented it.
