POINTED to West Point, 1899; graduated, 1903; 2nd Lt. Engineers, June 11, 1903; 1st Lt. Engineers, April 23, 1904; Capt. Engineers, February 27, 1911; Major Engineers, December 11, 1915; Colonel Infantry, August 5, 1917; Brigadier General, June 26, 1918; Commanding General, 84th Infantry Brigade, August 6, 1918; Commanding General, 42nd Division, November, 1918. Wounded on March 9, 1918, at Neuville, and on October 11, 1918, at Exermont.

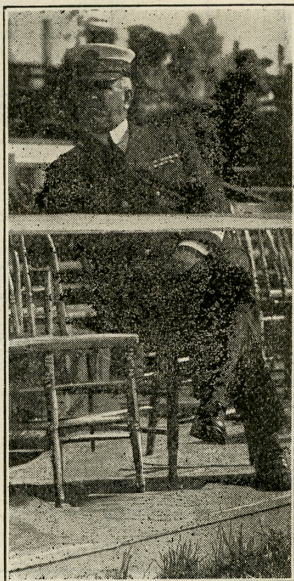

Superintendent, Naval Academy.

Luce, Commander-in-Chief, North Atlantic Station, 1888; transferred to staff of Rear Admiral Chandler, Commander-in-Chief, China Station; returned to United States, 1889; served with U. S. Eclipse Expedition, West Coast of Africa; served on South Atlantic and Pacific Stations and Bering Sea Patrol until 1892; Hydrographic Service until 1894; China Station until 1897; Hydrographic Service until 1898; Topeka and north coast of Cuba, 1898; Naval Academy until 1901; Pacific Station, 1901; Naval Academy, 1904; Commanded U. S. S. *Severn*, 1905; Cuban Pacification, 1906; North Atlantic Fleet, 1907; Hydrographic Office, 1909; Naval Academy, 1910; Commanded U. S. S. *Prairie*, 1913; S. O. P., San Domingan waters, Victorian Revolution, 1912; Commanding Naval Training Station, Norfolk, 1913; Commanding U. S. S. *Delaware*, 1916; served as part of the 6th Battle Squadron of Grand Fleet; Commandant, Naval Training Station, Great Lakes, and of the 9th, 10th and 11th Naval Districts; February, 1919, Superintendent, Naval Academy.

CAPTAIN GEORGE HONNEN.

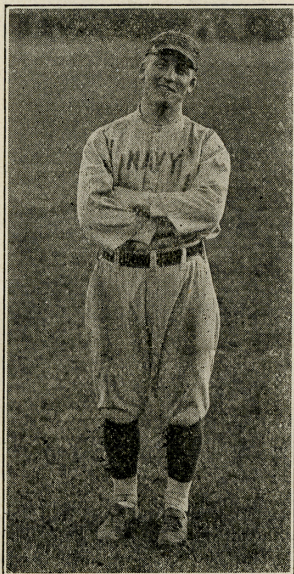


APTAIN GEORGE HONNEN, who leads the Army baseball team this year, is both the most versatile and dependable man on the Kaydet team. Honnen played three different positions for the Army during the 1919 season, starting in right field, being shifted to first base and, finally, playing shortstop in the Navy game. This year Honnen has been played in the outfield, at first base, at third base and is now settled at shortstop.

Honnen comes from Philadelphia, is a Lieutenant in the Corps of Cadets and graduates from the Military Academy this June. He obtained his appointment from the Army and served, as an enlisted man, with the American Expeditionary Forces in France for nine months before entering West Point.

JOHN B. LOBERT, known in the baseball world as Hans Lobert, is completing his third year as the Army baseball coach, having come to West Point from the New York National League Club in 1918.

Hans played third base professionally for fourteen years, from 1904 to 1917, inclusive. Twelve years of this time he was a member of the National League clubs, Cincinnati, Philadelphia and New York, being captain of Cincinnati in 1909. He is the holder of the world's record circling the bases, having established the time of 13 3-5 seconds. In the years 1913-1914, as a member of the New York "Giants," he made a tour of the world.

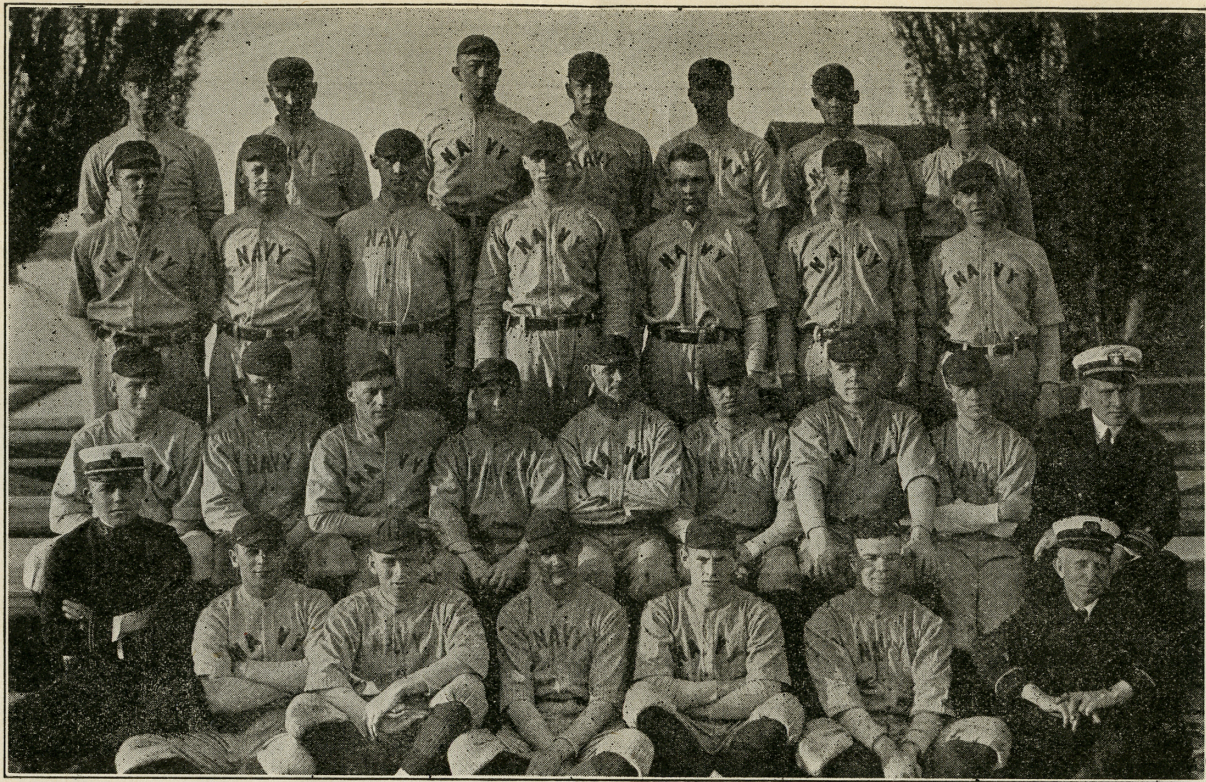



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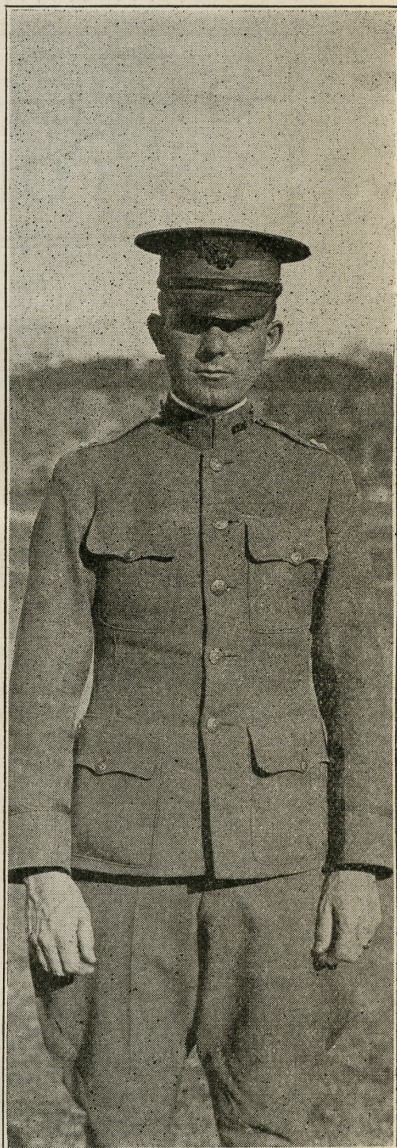
