CURTAIN DESCENDS ON COMMODORE BASEBALL SEASON

The season will end this week for one of the strongest baseball teams in the country —the Bainbridge Commodores of 1945.

By virtue of their very successful showing over the last six months, Manager Ray Lucas' men qualify as the highest rated service team in the United States. In competition with other nines composed of men in the service, the Commodores won 36 of 51 games. These victories include triumphs over such adversaries as the powerful Curtis Bay Coast Guard Cutters, in which series Bainbridge won ten contests while dropping only four. Camp Lee, Camp Shelton, Norfolk N.A.S., Norfolk N.T.S., Camp Bradford and Aberdeen were some of the other Army and Navy teams against whom the Commodores' enviable record was rung up.

Nor has Bainbridge shone only against other service outfits. In opposition with major league clubs, decisions have come the Commodores' way in six games, and have been unfavorable only three times, with two ties. Perhaps the highlight of Bainbridge's season was the 6-3 defeat of the rampaging Detroit Tigers, or the 9-6 setback of the St. Louis Cardinals, World Champs of 1944, or maybe the twin pasting of the Washington Senators, 18-7 and 4-1.

But now the season is ending for the Commodores, and the crack of the bat and the sound of ball hitting glove will be missing from Tome Field. Though the season ends, and though these stars will probably never all perform on the same team again, there still stands for all to see the sterling achievements of the Bainbridge Commodores of 1945.

FACTS AND FIGURES ON THE 1945 COMMODORES

The excellent season's record compiled by the Bainbridge baseball team as a unit is reflected in the individual performances of the players. No less than six of the Commodore nine pelted the ball for better than 300 averages, despite pitching of high caliber from opposing teams.

Throughout most of the season the race for the squad batting championship was a two-way dog-fight between right fielder Dick Sisler and Ford Garrison, his neighbor in the left gardens. Both stickmen held the lead for alternate long stretches, but the final outcome of the competition is still in doubt. Conflicts for other batting departments such as runs batted in, home run and total hit columns are also being waged, as the tables below indicate.

Iron-armed Ken Raffensberger was the pride of the small but efficient Commodore mound corps. The untiring left-hander won just about half of the nine's victories, with capable hurling being provided by Earl Naylor and Sid West also.
